



The past year has seen some changes in the way that the group deals with our internal workings, and whilst this journey is ongoing, I think we are progressing well. We've automated the way volunteers claim expenses, introduced automated online payments, an online store, along with many other behind the scene efficiency savings.

So, all it remains for me to say is thanks for all you do, and look out for our bite sized news flashes. and here's to another year of bringing Skills for Life!



Treasurer's Report - Jake Gordon

This report covers the financial year 2023-24 for the 12th Aylesbury Scout Group. Since last year's AGM, all sections have taken responsibility for their own bank accounts, where they can manage payments and receipts specific to their trips, camps etc. Overall, this is working successfully & will allow us to ensure we have clearer visibility on group and section finances once we have finished allocating money that was collected in the group account prior to the section accounts being up and running.

Our District subscription (Capitation) cost rose slightly over the previous year to £65.00 per child compared with £62.00 in the previous year. However, the 2023-24 accounts contain last year's expenses since the invoice relating to this expense tends to arrive in early April, just after the end of our financial year.

We have continued to have parents using camp bank funds that were built up during COVID lockdowns to pay for various trips & activities, while more parents of former members have been kind enough to donate some of this money to the group. We will be proactive over the next year in reminding parents who have this money available to use it.

Our fundraising efforts produced less overall than last year, however, we were able to take advantage of some new opportunities, such as the Kingsbrook live event, which we believe holds great fundraising potential in future. With a dedicated Gift Aid officer on board, we expect to be able to bring additional into the group over the coming year by this means.

Finally, we have continued to invest in various equipment to enable us to maximise the experience our members get from Scouting. The overall financial health of the group is good, with various reserves in place to ensure that we can deal with any unexpected expenses & make sure that cost is never a barrier to anyone participating in the group.

The children enjoyed the exciting activities including caving, campfire, smores, star gazing and sleeping in tents indoors. We then did fireworks craft and filled the month with a discussion about space missions and the solar system.

The space theme continued into December as we watched videos of different constellations and stories behind them.



We ended the month celebrating Christmas with either a visit to the panto at the Waterside Theatre or games with the Buckingham Park Cubs.

January was a month of variety from setting personal challenges inspired by New Year's resolutions to making chatterboxes, origami animals and paper toys and ending the month learning and performing entertaining magic tricks!

We held our annual Chinese New Year food tasting in February and made dragons to celebrate the Year of the Dragon. Vicky popped in to wow us with science experiments, including a lava lamp the children could take home. We also learnt about different beaver colonies around the world, their names, promises and national flags.


> ingredients! And, and, they had to make their shelters to sleep in, which most of them did! So, a huge well done to all on this one.
